As a media historian, my work touches on a variety of related disciplines, including journalism studies and media law. My primary research stream focuses on innovation and technological change in an information economy. Among other places and spaces, I examine the centers of news production and distribution, including the formative role of the American newsroom on journalism's professionalization project during the twentieth century. As part of this, I explore the early computerization of the newsroom and the adoption of the internet, the use of reporting technology, and the development of professional identity and occupational values within journalism as an occupational field. I also focus on the current daily labor of news workers and how they form those identities and values in the context of larger social and economic forces.

My research agenda thus sits at the intersection of technology and materiality studies, where it engages with two guiding questions: 1) **how do information and news workers experience and respond to changes in their workplaces and technology tools over time?** and then, more broadly, 2) **how do transitions from analog to digital technologies occur in information economies, as experienced by information workers, especially journalists?**
